Our Youngsters Are Our Future

It's 6.00pm on Monday, the music stands are in place in three rooms at the bandroom and young people start to arrive, some carrying instruments half as big as themselves. One or two are still in their school uniforms showing that many schools from Loughborough and beyond are represented. Our youngsters are the life blood of the band with many of our senior players having completed the journey at Hathern from beginners to seniors.

We've said before that brass bands like ours are increasingly a very important resource for children to learn to play an instrument and appreciate music. Music provision in many schools is not what it was and the option of paying for music lessons is not one that is open to many families. Youngsters who learn with Hathern Band get the use of an instrument and lessons at no cost other than a £4 per month membership fee.

Youngsters come to us via a number of routes. Before Covid, we would regularly go out to schools and give a session with a group of five or six band members. In our area, the children are on side immediately as Dave Newman takes along a post-horn and plays the Post-Horn Gallop which is instantly recognised as the introduction to Leicester City matches. The instruments are explained and volunteers have a go at playing a note. Others who join are already learning an instrument and come along to experience playing with others in a band. We also get several youngsters who follow in the footsteps of siblings or parents.



In 2019 during Hathern's Big Week, our Monday night session was held in the big marquee on the park. It was an open session to let the people of Hathern see our young musicians in action. At the end there was an invitation to any young people to come up and have a go. A few did and some new recruits were made. It's hard to believe that was nearly three years ago, but as the Big Week is back to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, we will be repeating the event on 30 May and hopefully we'll encourage youngsters to give it a go.



The break due to Covid gave us the opportunity to rethink our band training. Previously, we had a beginners group who progressed to the Training Band which included a range of abilities. Youngsters then moved on to the Youth Band. Now our 34 young people are organised in five groups of similar ability. The first group is the beginners' group who start to get to grips with their instruments under the watchful eye of Sam Peak.

In the past adults have sat in during practice, and we found after Covid, that the youngsters make much more progress without having mum or dad watching on. We know that this has caused some inconvenience, but we do believe this is the best approach for learning. The other big change has been the new extension which allows us to have three groups operating at the same time. Lesley Bentley looks after the learners group in the new room.





The next stage is the first of Dave Newman's groups who also play at 6.00pm in the band room.



As the youngsters in Dave's first group progress, they move into the second group which takes over the band room at 7.00pm.





At 8.00pm it's the turn of the Youth Band, several of whom are also sitting in with Concert Brass on a Thursday evening.

We mustn't forget a very important part of Monday nights - the popular tuck shop managed by Ira Tristanto.

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Midlands Area Contest 2022

We reported in the last newsletter that the Senior Band was taking part in the Midlands Area Contest on 27 February. The test piece was Spectrum, composed by Gilbert Vintner. The work is a musical depiction of the seven colours of the spectrum and is a challenging piece.

As ever, the Band put in a great deal of work and played the piece at an open rehearsal in the church on 15 February. Col. Stephen Barnwell acted as "adjudicator" for the performance and gave useful advice. The Band really played well and we had high hopes of a good placing. 4Barsrest is the premier brass banding website and they send their own experts to the various area contests to report live on their Facebook page. Unlike the adjudicators, the 4barsrest team has sight of the bands as they play. They ranked Hathern as a top six performer, even saying we were "dark horses" for a top two spot. They reported that after the top two bands "Rushden, Sovereign, Hathern and Foss Dyke found favour with others in the hall".

It was a great surprise, or dare I say shock that we were eventually placed 13th. It's the nature of the brass banding game and like other bands, it's easy to say "we wuz robbed", however many neutral experienced bandspeople who were there had difficulty understanding the placings beyond the top two or three. We will put it behind us with the knowledge that the Band gave a great performance.

Golden Rules for Ensemble Playing

1. Everyone should play the same piece.

Stop at every repeat sign and discuss in detail whether to take the repeat or not. Listeners will love this a lot!

3. Carefully tune your instrument before playing. That way you can play out of tune with a clear conscience.

4. Take your time turning pages.

- The right note at the wrong time is a wrong note (and viceversa).
- 6. If everyone gets lost except you, follow those who get lost.
- 7. If a passage is difficult, slow it down. If it's easy, speed it up. Everything will work itself out in the end.
- If you are completely lost, stop everyone and say "I think we should tune".
- Happy are those who have not perfect pitch, for the kingdom of music is theirs.
- If the ensemble has to stop because of you, explain in detail why you got lost. Everyone will be very interested.
- A wrong note played timidly is a wrong note. A wrong note played with authority is an interpretation.
- When everyone else has finished playing, you should not play any notes you have left.
