# Christmas 2022

It was really great to get back to normal this year and get out to play at Christmas concerts. In recent years the programme starts with a concert at St. Helena's Church at West Leake. # **Hathern Band Christmas Concert**

My granddaughter happily plays tenor horn in the Hathern Training Band and played in the Christmas Concert on 17 December which we were able to go and watch. The trainees had bedecked their instruments with tinsel and baubles in some cases and most wore Santa hats – all very festive. They all seemed to thoroughly enjoy their rendition of Jingle Bells – as did we, their doting families and carers. As music teaching in schools has dwindled due to curriculum constraints it is a privilege to be able to see the enjoyment, confidence and pleasure that making music together can bring to children.

The programme for the concert was very varied, all Christmassy and included some pieces that were new to me. One was 'Who is he in yonder stall?' with words by Benjamin Russell Hanby an American hymn writer. He was active in The Underground Railway, which sought to help enslaved African Americans escape to freedom in the north and Canada. The tune was haunting and melodic and the words, found easily on the internet, are the story of Jesus from birth to resurrection – just beautiful. The other tune new to me was much more energetic. 'Schneewalzer' involved some of the audience swaying to the waltz rhythm and then jumping up, waving their arms and sitting back down at particular points during the chorus! Just when I had watched enough and thought I could work out the moves, it finished on a flourish and to great applause. The words to some of the Christmas carols the different groups played with expertise and joy, were included in our programmes and so we in the audience were able to join in, with gusto if not always with accuracy. As Eric Morecambe once said singing "all the right notes, just not necessarily in the right order"!

The concert was a showcase for the talented musicians who freely give of their time, not only to play and progress as musicians in their own right, but to encourage younger people to do the same. The Youth Band and the Senior Band members all showed us their musical talents and their efforts were rightly rewarded with applause and cheering. The Concert Brass are all very talented musicians and their expertise and enthusiasm shone in their playing as they brought out the colour, detail flow and wit of the music. The Hathern Band family showed us what we had been missing in not being able to attend live music concerts for some years. It was a delight and a privilege to see how people can really lose themselves in playing to others who share their joy and applaud their efforts.

The whole concert was an absolute treat! Thank you to all those who put so much effort into bringing us this excellent start to the Festive Season. Don't miss it this year!

The audience at our Christmas Concert can't have failed to have been impressed by the beautiful playing of the young man sitting in the Senior Band's principal cornet's chair.

That was Seb Burrows who has now been appointed principal cornet at the ripe old age of fifteen. We think he is probably the youngest principal cornet in the band's history. We featured Seb in the newsletter a year ago and we asked him for a bit more information.



"I was six when I started to learn the cornet at Hathern Band. Someone had come along to school with either a euphonium or bass, I went home and asked my mum if I could learn to play the trumpet without knowing what the instrument was! Friends recommended Hathern Band and I came along for lessons on the cornet, my fingers being too small for anything else at the time! I now play cornet and trumpet and I'm learning to play the piano and that is coming on fairly well. My dad plays classical guitar but my mum and brother aren't musical.

I'm studying for my GCSEs, my subjects being Maths, Physics, Fine Art plus Grade 5 music theory which I should hopefully be sitting anytime over the next month. I really haven't decided what I want to do later in life, but art - sketching, digital painting, things like that - is something I think I would like to pursue in the future. Whether that leads to a job in illustrating or designing - I think such a thing would really suit me. Of course, whatever I do, music is something I want to continue to pursue, it's something I really enjoy doing.
