The Band has had a couple of disappointing results in recent contests which means relegation to the Second Section for 2024.

The result has given the band a lot of encouragement and the focus is on achieving promotion back to the First Section.

So off we set on our seasonal programme of concerts, kicking off with the Senior Band and a concert at West Leake church on 1 December. Can something you have only done twice be called a tradition? I am beginning to think so. For me now, my traditional start to Christmas has to be the Christmas Hathern Band Concert. It was a mix of the old and the new to me. We had the words of well-known carols so we could join in the singing. The final decision about if we in the audience sang better than the people of Quorn had the night before was a bit vague, but at least those who joined in sang with gusto.

The arrangement of Away in a Manger was, for me, the highlight of the evening. As the widow of an Anglican priest, I have lost count of the number of times I have heard this carol. It had slipped down my list of popularity, but this new (to me) arrangement has put it firmly back in my Top Five. Beautiful! Special mention of the soloist in this carol, Seb Burrows, at sixteen he was amazing.

"O du fröhliche", a German carol, was new to me, and the words when I looked them up later, seemed highly appropriate for the current state of some parts of the Middle East.

"Jingle-Mas", played by the Hathern Training Band was a delight in my unbiased opinion. Once again, creativity with tinsel was apparent in the youngsters' decoration of their instruments. My granddaughter chose purple and silver this year. All the young people in the various bands showed their enthusiasm and were encouraged by their conductors and other older musicians who helped. It is a joy to see them teach newer musicians their love of their craft.

Prokovief's "Troika", Leroy Anderson's "A Christmas Festival", Tormé and Wells "The Christmas Song" and Berlin's "White Christmas" are old favourites which were superbly performed and we can recognise, even if we are unsure of the names of their composers.

New to me this year was "The Tipteerers' Carol", which turned out to be also known as "The Sussex Mummers Carol" upon further research. Tipteerers or Mummers (possibly from the Greek word 'mommo' for mask) are players who went round villages putting on plays with a variety of characters from St George and the Dragon, Father Christmas, a Turk, a soldier and some ruffians. Mummers expected to be paid as they were usually local farm workers, laid off during the winter months and drinking and revelry usually ensued, leading to some mummers being banned in certain villages. These plays are still performed in Sussex, hence the alternative title.

I still have not mastered all the moves to "Schneewaltzer", but once again half the audience took enthusiastic part and thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

Enjoyment and admiration are now an integral part of the audience's reaction to the Bands' performances. The music they play is entertaining as well as touching and my admiration for their dedication and musicianship is boundless. My thanks once again to all those who work so hard behind the scenes and the instruments in many unseen ways to bring us such an entertaining start to the Christmas season.
